

WHAT


Every organization on the planet knows WHAT they do. These are products they sell or the services

"I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light"

(ELW 815) is one of my favorite hymns for this time in the church year. Here is an article from *Hymnal Companion to Evangelical Lutheran Worship*:

Kathleen Armstrong Thomerson (February 18, 1934 – April 7, 2025) was an American organist and hymnwriter. She wrote both the hymn and its tune in St. Louis, during the hot summer of 1966, where she lived with her husband and two-year old son. Her mother was coming to visit but was delayed by an airline strike. The temperature hovered up to 105° F., there was no air conditioning, her son had heat rash, and brownouts killed traffic lights and made driving hazardous. They decided to drive to her mother's air-conditioned house in Houston until after the heat wave broke. Anticipating the visit to her family and friends at the Episcopal Church of the Redeemer, she wrote the melody and first stanza before they left St. Louis, finishing the rest in Houston, for which the tune is named. --Paul Westermeyer, ©2010 Augsburg Fortress.

Some of you have heard my own story around this hymn. Connie and I sang this hymn almost every night to our kids when they were little. The night before the movers came to take us to Springfield from Valparaiso, we all slept on mats in the basement and sang this as our last song together in our home. As anyone who has moved with kids can tell you, it's a difficult process, and you don't feel at home again for a while. Although I was working for another church in Springfield at first, I had a Sunday off and visited Grace. When you sang this beloved hymn, it felt like home. For me, it was a sign. Theron retired later that year, and I applied for and was offered the job, confirming the direction God was leading. I am so thankful for the past 11 years serving as your cantor at Grace Lutheran Church.

The resilience of our volunteers and clients never ceases to amaze when the full force of winter hits, and that resilience was certainly on display again this month through two major snowfalls and a few days of some truly bitter temperatures. Through these challenges, the Food Pantry has been open every scheduled day, and we had at least 40 to 50 client visits even on the worst weather days.

Several big thank yous are in order to those who keep our outside distribution point as safe and clear as possible for clients and volunteers alike in the season of snow and ice. The National Park Service and City of Springfield are supportive, patient and tolerant of us as things get a little tight on the sidewalk and in the area where cars pull up along Capitol Avenue. And -- as they do year-round -- the Grace staff pitches in double time with snow shoveling, loading and unloading to help us in inclement weather. Thank you Pastor Krieger, Kim, Aaron and JB!

The generosity of our community also never ceases to amaze, especially with the annual surge of food and monetary donations from friends both old and new that come in every Thanksgiving-Christmas season. We just received notice that for the third year we have received a competitive grant -- this year for \$30,000 -- from the St. Joseph's Home Legacy of Care Fund at the Community Foundation for the Land of Lincoln. This grant will almost fully fund our annual cost of serving our senior citizen clients, who number about 3,500 a year.

Some of our other major gifts this holiday season were mentioned in last month's report, but here is a full accounting of major food and financial donations we've received since early November:

St. John's Lutheran Church Endowment Fund -- \$1,500 (in addition to annual donations from St. John's members which total \$15,000 to \$20,000).

ELCA Central/Southern Illinois Social Ministry, Justice and Advocacy grant -- \$1,200.

Our Savior's Lutheran Church Women's Mission Circle -- \$200

This month the Food Pantry will again be the beneficiary of the News Channel 20 Weather Team's 3-degree Temperature Challenge, sponsored by Green Family Stores, which has brought us \$2,100 in each of the past two years.

Pantry volunteers this month again joined with members of Grace and Peace Lutheran to pack and distribute Christmas good baskets to 80 families. Grace sponsors baskets provided to families from McClernand Elementary and Franklin Middle schools, and Peace sponsors baskets for families from Blackhawk Elementary School.

November marked the Pantry's sixth straight month of serving more than 1,000 households. Our year-to-date client totals through November 30 were 10,387 households served, a 7 percent increase over the same period a year ago, and 27,037 individuals served, an 11 percent increase over last year. By the end of November we had already served more clients than we did in all of 2024 and are on pace to end the year serving close to 11,000 households representing nearly 30,000 individuals.

date donations of \$257,722 against expenses of \$249,454, leaving an account balance of \$63,486. Our donations are up 34 percent over last year, while expenses are up about 20 percent. That balance of \$63,486 compared favorably with a balance of \$55,268 at the end of November 2024.

With receipt of the St. Joseph's Home grant now confirmed we will end 2025 with an account balance of right around \$100,000, compared with a balance of \$85,567 at the end of last year.

It's been another gratifying and humbling year of helping address the tragedy of food insecurity amongst us -- thanks to the incredible food ministry of Grace and the growing support of our four other "anchor" churches and an increasing number of additional churches, schools, community organizations and individuals from a broad cross-section of the community.

Faith Community Nurse Article January 2026 Parish Nurse...Diana Weyhenmeyer



Happy New Year! A new beginning for everyone. I thought I would start out the year talking about an educational program I attended over zoom for Faith Community Nurses. The title was, "The Gentle Art of Swedish Death Cleaning: A Guide to Decluttering Your Life and Legacy." The program was about decluttering your life and home. She first discussed having a plan and putting it down in a notebook. This is so you can follow your plan. Don't take on your whole house, maybe a corner of a room at a time.

Then you collect four tubs for items. You ask yourself, "Will anyone be happy if I save this or want this for themselves?" If the answer is no get rid of it. She said to ask yourself, three questions, will anyone be happier if I save this, will anyone benefit from this and does it fit now? The first tub is for keeping items. Ask does this item bring me joy? The second tub is for donating items. The third tub is for trash and last tub is for relocating items. Say the item was in the dining room and you now think it belongs in the living room. This tub is for relocating it. She had a great idea for redoing your valuable information like passwords. Put them all in a notebook along with information you want others to know about. This includes funeral arrangements, bank, retirement accounts - where they are, and any other thing that is important to you.

She made another very good point of letting stuff go. She gave her example of her china. She asked her kids and none of them wanted it, so it got donated. She stressed simplify your life now and you will enjoy life more. I have a sign in my bedroom that I see every day with the word simplify. I am still looking at it for motivation. She also stressed to do more with less. She said it is important to be gentle with yourself. Start small and don't get overwhelmed.

She suggested the following items for your project and support.

- Physical Tools such as a shredder and tubs for collecting items
- Personal Action Plan
- Celebrate your progress no matter how big or small

Goal is a more peaceful and free life.

I have to have 20 hours of continuing education in order to keep my registered nurse license and it comes due in May 2026. This program was provided by the Lutheran Faith Community Nurse Association. I've been a member for many years, on the educational team and soon to be a Director of Region 5 in the Midwest. I enjoy these programs; people from all over attend them. I've met people from Alaska, California, Arizona, the Midwest to Maryland and Florida. It is interesting to see what everyone is doing in their congregations.

I hope 2026 brings many blessings to you and your loved ones.

The council met in November. We did not meet for December and will meet early in January.

Some highlights from November meeting:

- Current and Building on the decline in the past months.
- **MOTION** to approve date for a congregational meeting during Grace Forum to discuss the pew arrangement for May 17, 2026—**approved**
- Draft Budget for 2026 includes recommendation of 2.5% increase for staff and a 14% insurance increase as well.
- Jim Schlouch will once again put together a budget narrative to be included at the annual meeting.
- Church insurance is being shopped for the coming year coverage.
- Nominating Committee working to get 5 members for Council and 1 member for Grace Trust.
- Thanksgiving baskets went well with extra donations from Country market of turkeys.
- Stewardship sent out Time & Talent along with Intent letters for 2026.
