Composer spotlight: Marty Haugen

Marty Haugen is one of the beloved modern composers of church music. With education and professional experience in both Lutheran and Catholic circles, he knows his way around the Church's historic liturgy texts and has written liturgy settings. We know three of these at Grace: *ELW Setting 2*, the "Now the Feast" liturgy, and "Holden Evening Prayer."



In addition, his hymns (either as the writer of text or tune, or most often, both) appear no less than 20 times in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, and seven times in *All Creation Sings*. Some of our favorites at Grace include "Awake, Awake, and Greet the New Morn," "Tree of Life and Awesome Mystery," "Gather Us In," "Healer of Our Every Ill," "All Are Welcome," "Shepherd Me, O God," "Soli Deo Gloria."

This Lent, we are learning another of Marty's songs as our offertory: "Now Is the Time of Grace," from *All Creation Sings*.

As we have watched the events of the past few months in Minneapolis, I have been thinking of the many church music folks who live there, including Marty Haugen. Our prayer response by Heidi Wilson, "Hold On," has been used prominently there as people find a voice calling for justice. May the songs of Heidi and Marty continue to help us as we find our voice in worship "here in this place."

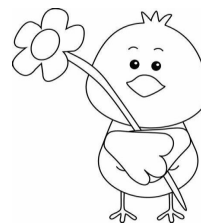

FOOD PANTRY REPORT

As Christ fed the multitudes, the mission of the Grace Lutheran Church Food Pantry is to feed the hungry.

The Food Pantry continues to benefit from a gratifying level of community-wide support from donors old and new.

We were excited to receive 600 cans, boxes and packages of food from West Side Christian Church. Over the past several years our Food Pantry Board has worked to expand our reach into the broader community, while respecting that we do not want to compete for support from entities that already have relationships that address food insecurity through other groups. West Side Christian Church was one of the places where we've had an opportunity to introduce ourselves, and we were truly blown away to receive this large, first-time donation from them.

We also had a good introductory meeting this month with Trinity Lutheran Church and appreciate that they are considering if there are ways they might support our work. And we joined a monthly luncheon group for seniors from St. John's Lutheran to create more awareness of our work and their church's support – and to thank them for that support.

Bunn Gourmet has been a regular donor of meat products and recently brought us about 1,000 packages of summer sausages, Polish sausages and beef snack sticks.

Likewise, we frequently receive donations of surplus items from various activities of local Scouting organizations. In recent weeks, the Abraham Lincoln Council of Scouts donated 18 large boxes of popcorn and other snacks, and Grace member Mark Wilson brought us 40 dozen eggs that had been earmarked for a Scouts event that had to be canceled due to extreme weather.

Lowe's has also occasionally contacted us to offer items that they need to clear from their inventory. We recently picked up a full pallet of Gatorade from them (1,296 24-ounce bottles) – very popular with clients.

Peace Lutheran Church again sponsored a "Souper Bowl of Caring" collection which brought us 263 cans of soup.

We've also had an overwhelming outpouring of support this winter from several members of Grace who used Thrivent Action Team grants (\$250 each) and personal donations to supply us with winter hats, gloves and socks that so many of our clients desperately need and are grateful to receive.

Financial donations from across the community also have been exceptional early in the new year. Our on-line donation opportunity on the church website has already brought in \$1,788, and cash/check donations from individuals beyond our five anchor churches is over \$7,000 thus far in 2026. A big factor in these donations from the community at-large was likely our recent appearance on News Channel 20, which showed us accepting a \$2,300 donation from Green Family Stores, sponsor of the station's Three-Degree Weather Guarantee program, followed by an interview on the station's Midday news program. We know that this type of media visibility enhances awareness of our work and creates interest and support from new friends.



Seeing young people volunteering at the Pantry and organizing food drives at their schools are among the most uplifting experiences one can have in our fight against food insecurity. We have a longstanding relationship with the Franklin Middle School Beta Club, which collected 2,430 food items for us during the Thanksgiving-Christmas season, and the club recently supplemented that with a donation of \$500 collected during the food drive. Another recurring source of support from young people has been the UIS Volunteer Center. UIS volunteers helped us one day in February and have scheduled additional visits in March and April.


We have truly been blessed and humbled by this outpouring of support to start the new year. As of Feb. 2, our year-to-date income of \$20,309 exceeded expenses of \$11,874 by \$8,435, leaving us with an account balance of \$105,317. History tells us that this balance is very likely to draw down over the next several months, BUT we have a very solid foundation from which to manage that in the near-term.

While the support is uplifting, it remains an unfortunate fact of life that it is desperately needed. In January we served 890 households (a 26 percent increase over January 2025), representing 2,521 individuals. Those are frightening numbers when one considers that we had two major snowfalls and several bouts of bitter cold on days when the Pantry was open. Thanks to the commitment of our volunteers, we have not yet had to close due to extreme weather this year, and, of course, there have been clients on foot, on bikes, by bus and by vehicle each and every day we've been on duty.

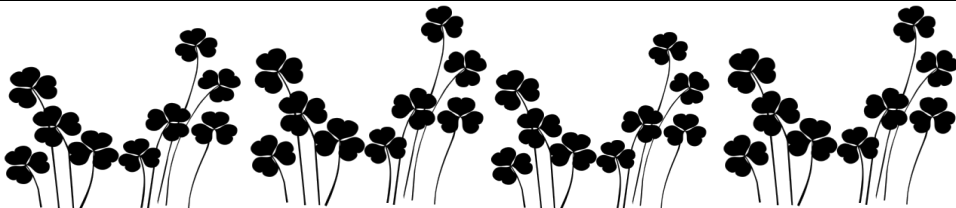

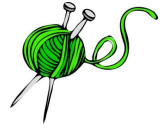

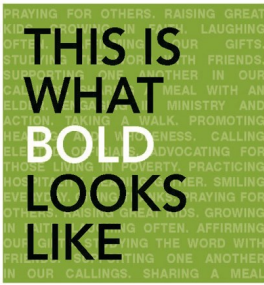

Bold Woman: Gari Hurst



Gari first came to Grace in 2017 with her sister, Arlene Honeycutt. They were both looking for a church to welcome them. When they visited Grace, Judy Wollet came up to them in the parking lot, greeting and welcoming them that day. Gari and her sister knew then that Grace would be the place for them. After coming to Grace, Gari began to get involved in the Food Pantry and in both WELCA circles. She is a member of the Twisted Stitchers and knits hats and mittens for those in need. Gari serves on the Parish Life committee helping to prepare meals for potlucks, Advent and Lenten dinners. Often, she will come early to set up and will stay late for cleanup. Gari

enjoys cooking and helping and serving others. She has what she describes as a helium hand. Her hand becomes lighter than air and rises like a helium balloon making her one of the first to volunteer. Because of this helium hand she has become a valuable resource for church functions. Besides volunteering, Gari often looks for other ways to help such as cleaning the kitchen dumbwaiter. She even gave it a fresh coat of paint. She is currently working with Aaron on giving the downstairs women's restroom a fresh look.

When not working at Grace, Gari is a member of the Society for Creative Anachronism (SCA). SCA is a club that meets locally as well as all over the continental USA. YOUR HEALTH NEWS **Parish Nurse...Diana Weyhenmeyer**

February was heart month so I am writing on heart health as we are going into March. New guidelines came out in 2025 replacing guidelines from 2017. Blood pressure is important for heart health.

Normal blood pressure (BP) is less than 120 mm Hg systolic and under 80 mm Hg diastolic
Elevated BP 120-129 mm Hg systolic and less than 80 mm Hg diastolic

- Stage 1 hypertension is 130 to 139 mm Hg systolic or 80 to 89 mm Hg diastolic
- Stage 2 hypertension is 140 mm Hg systolic or over 90 mm Hg diastolic

Tips to help your blood pressure

- Don't add salt at the table to your food.
- Exercise always helps lower your blood pressure. I took mine the other day after exercising and it was 108/65. I used to be 90/60. As we get older; our blood pressure rises I've noticed.
- Diet that is rich in fruits and vegetables and whole grains.
- Manage stress. Stress always causes the blood pressure to rise. Avoid tobacco

Little Lambs Update

OVERVIEW

For more than six years, Barbara Kayaga has overseen the school she co-founded with Kristin. As the number of students increased to 50-60, the workload became too much for Barbara and her husband Brian. At its inception, there were plans for ongoing fundraising and touring with singing but that was impossible with one person left to run the program. Despite their dedication to sustaining the school's mission, staffing and financial limitations now make it impossible to maintain this scale. This was never meant to be a singular venture and fundraising and more community involvement was meant to happen.

CHALLENGES OF EXPANSION

Continuing to grow at the current rate would require hiring four more teachers, securing additional resources, and partnering with another school for exams. Monthly expenses would rise to at least \$2,500, not including the costs for food, supplies for over 60 people, and regular maintenance. The school is registered to teach only Kindergarten through fourth grade, but at this level, it is no longer sustainable. As a result, Barbara and Brian have decided to keep just 10 children, including four of their own, Braeden, Yovella, Brandon, Ariana, Barry, Byron, Tyler, Leana, Maria, Amara, Kobe at the house/school, and will not accept any new enrollments.

TRANSITION FOR STUDENTS

Barbara waited as long as possible, prayed, and reflected deeply. She is disappointed she could not do more, but her commitment has been unwavering. Thanks to her and the staff, all other students are now ready to enter grade 1 and will continue their education at other schools.

Barbara's focus will now shift to the original 13 children from primary school, approximately fifth and sixth graders. She plans to sponsor these students for two more years, supporting them until their graduation in 2028.



Shanitah, Irene, Isaac, Evelyn, Michelle, Ethan, Elisha, Tracy, Asher, Beyonce, Hadijjah, Joyce and Sandra.

The enrolled primary school is a Christian institution, with tuition and uniforms costing about \$300 per child per month for the 13 students. While these costs are similar to current maintenance expenses, Barbara and the staff will be able to reduce their involvement and resource commitments.

All total for tuition and fees of older kids, staff and maintenance for the Little Lamb school is as follows:

January – March 4000.00 April - June 4000.00
July – September 4000.00 October - December 4000.00
