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FROM THE PASTOR

It seems like about every other time I went back to my childhood home, mom would tell me about some other relative who I had never before heard of in. I started to wonder just how expansive our family tree was, and if it ever had an end. (Could she have been related to Ed Munyer, and his coffee table talks? You can ask Marianne about those.)

One of the things I have learned from the Church over the years is that our collective family tree (the communion of saints) is without end. I have sung it as well, sometimes with these lyrics:

Every face (all my relatives) Every race (all my relatives) Every place (all my relatives) from "ALL MY RELATIVES" Words and Music by Larry Olson & Karol Baer, from To Be Alive[©] 1991 Dakota Road Music.

Our Central Southern Illinois Synod (CSIS) has structured Lutheran relatives in synods in Madagascar, and Upstate New York. I met some of the latter for the first time early last month for a joint synod colloquium. "Being Church Together: a second look at *Human Sexuality: Gift & Trust"* was lead by Bishop John Roth and Bishop Lee Miller. The distinctive views congregations can accept of denying or embracing persons LGBTQ+ were reiterated. One perspective celebrates LGBTQ+ persons as part of the community of faith. The other perspective says it is wrong. (I cannot imagine being told I do not fully belong to the community of faith because of who God created me to be.) I understand that the ELCA may be discussing this more. As that happens, Bishop Roth made the case for the value of 'disagreeing well.' Pastor Greg Busboom (St. John's Lutheran Church) pondered what 'disagreeing well' might look like in a congregation. It's a good question.

A quote in the colloquium that caught my attention, brothers and sisters in Christ, was offered by Bishop Miller as he shared with us the words of Dr. James Baldwin,

"We can disagree and still love each other unless your disagreement is rooted in my oppression and denial of my humanity and right to exist."

For Jesus' sake, may people of Grace "love each other" and support the humanity and existence of our oppressed siblings, no matter their race, creed, or gender identity.

During Worship Sunday morning we remain vigilant as safety is our top priority and that is the reason that the middle section of the narthex has been blocked off. The termite damage done just under that section of the sanctuary is substantial and the support beam in the crawl space is laying on a main water pipe. So as not to add to the damage, we are closing off the section just above there until repairs can be done. All doors are accessible but the isles down the side are the access to the pews. Greeters and ushers will be on either side at the 7th street doors and the ramp door is completely accessible. We hope this is just for a short time and we thank you for your continued care for our building and for each other.



Notes from the Cantor J.B. George...

Many times at Grace we have begun our Lenten journey with a procession around the church, singing the Great Litany, an extensive list of petitions, emphasizing our reliance on God. Our winding movement through the space reminds us of both the journey of the Hebrew people after their release from enslavement (40 years), and Jesus' journey through the desert, being tempted by the devil (40 days), and ultimately Jesus' journey to the cross.

For the very practical reason of needed repairs of the narthex floor (repairs on an old building are a journey of their own!), we cannot physically do the procession. Instead, we will sing a hymn which reminds us of many of the same things as we enter Lent.

"Bless Now, O God, the Journey" (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship* #326) was written by Sylvia G. Dunstan, an ordained minister in the United Church of Canada in the 20th century. We sing it to a sturdy Welsh tune known as LLANGLOFFAN.

Bless now, O God, the journey that all your people make, the path through noise and silence, the way of give and take. The trail is found in desert and winds* the mountain round, then leads beside still waters, the road where faith is found. (* as in "winding path")

Bless sojourners and pilgrims who share this winding way; your hope burns through the terrors, your love sustains the day. We yearn for holy freedom while often we are bound; together we are seeking the road where faith is found.

Divine eternal lover, you meet us on the road. We wait for land of promise where milk and honey flow, but waiting not for places, you meet us all around. Our covenant is written on roads, as faith is found.

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May God indeed bless our journey together through this Lent, and throughout our lives. JB

FOOD PANTRY REPORT

As Christ fed the multitudes, the mission of the Historical Grace Lutheran Church Food Pantry is to feed the hungry.

Support for the Food Pantry was very strong in January with donations including \$2,985 from St. John's Lutheran Church, a \$2,000 gift in memory of Mike Filter, \$1,035 from Peace Lutheran Church, \$1,000 from First Presbyterian Church, \$660 from the Beta Club at Franklin Middle School, \$243 as the third donation we've received from last year's Church World Service CROP Walk, \$128 from Grace WELCA, and ... \$3,831 from the generous members of Grace.

On the expense side, we were able to save thanks to the significant donations of food we received from numerous sources over the holiday season. All told, we enjoyed a rare monthly surplus of about \$4,600, which left us with an account balance of \$55,906 at the end of January. This is a very welcome and good start financially to 2023, but we know we will again be challenged as the year goes on to keep pace with increasing client numbers and high food prices.

In January we served 659 households, a 30 percent increase over the 504 households served in January 2022. We may see even bigger numbers in the coming months as enhanced food stamp benefits that were implemented at the start of the pandemic expire at the end of February.

As we kick off 2023, we're focused on three priorities: 1) maintaining our ability to provide all clients with milk, bread and eggs and provide the homeless with customized bags of foods, 2) increasing our fundraising in the community, especially from local businesses, and 3) expanding our pool of volunteers. On this last point, we have great crews who do the packing and related tasks inside, but we continue to struggle with having enough volunteers who can do the literal heavy lifting of boxes and bags (up to 20-30 pounds in some cases) and deliver items up the outside stairwell to clients.

Bold Women's Day, as stated on the WELCA.com web page, celebrates all Lutheran women who have acted or are acting boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ. Grace Lutheran Church's Bold Woman for 2023 is **Sara Oehlert**. Sara has been a member of Grace Lutheran for 45 years. Sara has been a widow for 10 years. Sara and her husband raised all 4 of their children at Grace Lutheran.

Sara has been a Sunday school teacher and served as Sunday School Superintendent in the past. She is currently a member of Ruth Circle and an active member of the WELCA Unit of Grace Lutheran Church. Sara sings in the church choir and is a



member of the church's bell choir. Sara was instrumental in starting our Stephen Ministry program at Grace. She also takes care of Grace Lutheran's prayer ministry. As if that is not enough, Sara also serves on the Evangelism Committee at Grace Lutheran. Sara is always there when help is needed.

In addition to all of her activities at Grace, Sara is a volunteer at Memorial Hospital in the infusion unit. She has also been a hospice volunteer also at Memorial. Sara volunteers for 2 months every year at the YMCA of the Rockies in Estes Park, Colorado helping families in the Craft and Design Center. An extra benefit of this is that when not doing her volunteer work she spends time enjoying the beautiful countryside and visiting with her family in the area.

Sara also volunteers for Everytown for Gun Safety/Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense. This group is working to raise awareness about the consequences of gun violence and to keep guns out of the hands of criminals. This is another way that shows how Sara cares for and tries to help all people.

In her spare time, Sara has lots of opportunities to travel as she has 11 grandchildren who live in New York, Colorado, Chicago and Springfield. Some of the activities Sara enjoys are: walking/hiking, knitting/ crocheting, reading and of course traveling.

Grace Lutheran Church is so blessed to be a part of Sara's busy life. She is a great example of what a Bold Woman is – always willing to help and support their congregations and the committee they live.

Stewardship Stories...

James Lewis, like our ancestors Abram & Sarai before us, is blessed to be a blessing.

"I'm glad the Lord sent me there [Grace]." You see, James' niece had died, and it crushed his heart; he was down. Our facilities steward (a.k.a. custodian) Aaron Von Holten could see it and offered the invitation to James to talk to our pastor; maybe it could help. So continued the Spirit's work in the building up of the kingdom at Grace.

After earning his Associates Degree from John A. Logan College in Carterville, James studied at SIU-C earning his Degree in Elementary/ Special Education. In Carbondale, James was the supervising teacher with Head Start, taught Elementary, and Jr. High. James lead a reeducation program at Murphysboro (where he was born, and graduated from high school), and then taught in Catholic and public schools in St. Louis; all totaled 38 years. The only reason James came back home from St. Louis during those latter years was to take care of his father, and then his mother, when they needed his care, and until they died.

James' work with youth extended beyond schools. Liberty Street Missionary Baptist Church in Murphysboro was not only the community of faith where James was baptized, but also where he would teach and be superintendent of Sunday School, and where he was recognized in Licensed Baptist Ministry (1968) and Ordained (1971). His twenty-five years of ordained ministry included a focus of evangelizing with youth, something he had an appreciation for, having been mentored by the older people he hung around, learned from, building a foundation in his life. It is a calling his brother Edgar would follow him in, and to this day, the pastor serving Liberty Street says she is there in no small part because of the foundation James laid in her life.

Where did this deep faith come from? God worked through James' parents and grandparents (and had plenty of time to do it... James' parents lived into their 90s, and both of James' greatgrandmothers lived to the ages of 104 and 110!). His parents and grandparents always said he was different; they saw something deeper in him. And you know they were paying attention, because James was the seventh of eighteen children (half of whom have died, James taking care of three of them). James spent a lot of time with older people: cutting wood, getting coal, mowing lawns. Just "*keep livin'"* James' mom would always say, and you'll see what we see in you. Her love set deep in his heart, like this: "there's nothing a person can do," James says, "to make me hate them. I learned from my mother to forgive, and give love, not hate."

During our interview, while James reflected on the difference Grace Lutheran Church has made in his life, he blessed our shared space with holy song from time to time, breaking into a chorus that gave words to what he was thinking – another way James has shared his faith with Grace in worship. James says, "Grace – God – has blessed me, and makes me want to bless (give, sacrifice for, give joy to) others. I can see great things being done [at Grace]." He went on to say, "Grace is doing, in my opinion, what the Bible says, more than any other church I've been in. Never been in a church so caring. And I know it's genuine... 'cause you don't have to." Evangelizing is still inspired in James as he says, "Going to Grace makes you want to go out and serve and give someone a smile."

James reflected, "God has been so good to me." This coming from a child of God who has had to say goodbye too soon to half of his siblings, who has known the battles of bone cancer, has suffered a broken neck in an auto accident, has endured the challenges of not having a house, and who's heart decided a pacemaker would make it so much easier to do it's job. More seriousness could not be in his eyes when he says, "I just keep sayin', thank you, thank you, thank you." Reminds me of the first words James began our interview with: "I'm thankful for life."



March is Colorectal Cancer Month and the American Cancer Society recommends screening start at age 45. They lowered the age from 50 because they found younger people were getting colon cancer. This can be a genetic test you can do at home and send in to be analyzed, a stool for occult blood test that can also be done at home. A colonoscopy is recommended every 10 years unless you are like me and high risk. My mother had colon cancer and that puts me at high risk. I have had a colonoscopy every 5 years since age 60. (I started screening late because I couldn't get past the prep. That is the hardest part of the entire procedure is taking the prep for it. Procedure is easy because you are asleep. They have made the prep much easier now than years ago.) A flexible sigmoidoscopy which only looks at the last part of the colon can be done every 5 years for screening purposes. A CT colonography can also be done every 5 years. This visualizes the colon by CT scan.

People who are in good health and with a life expectancy of more than 10 years should continue regular colorectal cancer screening through the age of 75. For people ages 76 through 85, the decision to be screened should be based on a person's preferences, life expectancy, overall health, and prior screening history. People over 85 should no longer get colorectal cancer screening. My dad had his first screening at age 90 when his hemorrhoids were bleeding. There are exceptions to every rule.

People at increased or high risk of colorectal cancer might need to start colorectal cancer screening before age 45, be screened more often, and/or get specific tests. This includes people with:

A strong family history of colorectal cancer or certain types of polyps

A personal history of colorectal cancer or certain types of polyps A personal history of inflammatory bowel disease (ulcerative colitis or Crohn's disease)

A known family history of a hereditary colorectal cancer syndrome such as familial adenomatous polyposis (FAP) or Lynch syndrome (also known as hereditary non-polyposis colon cancer or HNPCC)

A personal history of radiation to the abdomen (belly) or pelvic area to treat a prior cancer

It is much easier to treat a stage 1 or 2 colon cancer than stage 3 or 4.

Many lifestyle-related factors have been linked to colorectal cancer. In fact, the links between diet, weight, and exercise and colorectal cancer risk are some of the strongest for any type of cancer.

Diets high in red meat, charcoaled cooked meats, a body low in vitamin D are risk factors for colon cancer. Following a healthy eating pattern that includes plenty of fruits, vegetables, and whole grains, and that limits or avoids red and processed meats and sugary drinks probably lowers risk.
